John Kilbride, Camden & Amboy Railroad historian, to speak at the Kingston Historical Society's annual meeting on Tuesday, October 14 at 7:30 pm.

The meeting, at the Kingston Firehouse, on Heathcote Road, will include a very brief business meeting followed by Kilbride's slide illustrated talk on "Railroads and Kingston" which includes a history of the C&A Railroad and



the Rocky Hill Railroad. The C&A was the state's first railroad and enjoyed a monopolistic relationship with the State's legislators. Kilbride will cover the planning, construction and expansion of the lines that led to the creation of today's Northeast Corridor and conclude with thoughts on the present-day abandonment of the Rocky Hill Branch.

Kilbride retired from Amtrak after a 34-year career. He has been researching the C&A railroad since moving to NJ in 1979. He has published and continues to publish articles of historical research on a variety of railroad related subjects.

The C&A Branch Line – Camden, Trenton, along the D&R Canal to Kingston, Deans Pond and New Brunswick was completed in 1839. The original Kingston station was off Mapleton Road. The station was moved to opposite the Locktender's House when the Rocky Hill RR began operating in 1864. For a time the original C&ARR's John Bull engine was used on the Kingston/Rocky Hill Branch. **The meeting is free and open to all. Refreshments served.**

We will meet at the Kingston Presbyterian Church parking lot where George will begin his commentary on Kingston from 1683



to the 1930s. Quite a length of time, but all part of Kingston's story. Both Kingston and Princeton claim the house on the west side of the Kingston-Princeton Road, second from River Road as the first house in the area in 1683 – Dr. Henry Greenland's house which has served as an inn/tavern at the crossing of the Millstone River on the main road between NY and Philadelphia. More inns and taverns soon followed as did the Kingston Presbyterian Church, shops and mills. George will talk about Kingston's role in the Revolutionary War and the about the changes brought by the D&R Canal and the Camden & Amboy RR.

There have been many inquiries from the KHS website at "khsnj.org" about Kingston history.

One request concerned Van Tilburgh's Inn. M.K. Van Tilburg has written, "Van Tilburgh's Tavern/Inn, the Sign of the Mermaid: 1733-1880." Based on research from many sources and help of KHS members. The author included a drawing of "The Sign of the Mermaid" as it once looked on the corner of Laurel Avenue and Main Street (Route 27) before it was torn down. The article lists most inn mentions from various sources. KHS sent additional information from Van Tilburgh's Tavern License Petitions from the 1700s.

A request for information on Peter Shann, a Kingston Civil War veteran, was easily answered by George Luck, who had just given a performance as Peter Shann at the Kingston Presbyterian Church this June.
